# Getting Tattooed by Apo Whang-Od, the World's Oldest Mambabatok Tattoo Artist Merlyn Foronda, BSN, RN CCRN PNASD Recording Secretary

I had the opportunity to meet Apo Whang-Od last December 23, 2022, when we went on vacation to the Philippines. It was my son's idea, and he ensured it would be on our itinerary since he wanted a tattoo from her. Apo Whang-Od is famous among people who love tattooing, including my son. And now, Vogue magazine made her more famous worldwide by making her their oldest Vogue cover. She is an Indigenous woman from Buscalan, Kalinga, known for her legendary traditional tattooing technique, "batok."

From Baguio City, where my husband is from, we drove to Buscalan. It was 10 hours of scenic, winding, scary, and dangerous drive. It was foggy and raining too. We arrived around 9 am and thought we were early enough. But there were quite a few vehicles that came before us. Upon arrival at Buscalan, villagers were waiting for visitors to be the guides. They also told us we needed a guide to go up the mountain where Apo Whang-Od lives is mandatory. These guides were also part of their tribe. We went down the mountain and went up another hill to the village of Apo Whang-Od. It was a moderate hike that took about 45 minutes. When we got there, there were a lot of visitors and tourists already, which we did not expect since it was the day before Christmas Eve. Our guide brought us to one of the houses in the village where some of Apo Whang-Od's grandnieces live. She trained them in her traditional tattooing technique. Initially, I did not plan to get a tattoo, but since we drove so far and hiked two mountains, I told myself I must do this. It is my only chance to meet the famous 106-year-old tattoo artist and the last mambabatok of her generation.







The tattoo designs we had to choose from were unique, mostly symbols from the traditional Kalinga tribe. I chose a modern design that means faith, hope, and love. My husband and two children decided on the more conventional water, sun, and family design. Everyone had to buy a tattooing instrument called "runo," made from bamboo sticks, and the needle was from the thorn of a pomelo tree. Yes, pomelo tree! Less infection and sharper, they said. It cost one hundred (one hundred) pesos. The price of the tattoo depends on the design; the more intricate, the pricier. But it starts at five hundred (five hundred) pesos. The ink that they used is from charcoal mixed with water. I asked the grandniece where they got the charcoal. She excitedly said that it was from the "uling" outside the pots they used to cook with firewood! I was initially scared, being a nurse who is obsessive and compulsive about sterile technique and fearful of pain because there is no topical anesthesia and because it is my first tattoo! But I always kept reminding myself, "No guts, no glory," so, I did it! It hurt initially, but I got used to it. And the grandniece's tapping or batok technique was exceptionally light too. It also helped me keep talking to her about their cultures and traditions to distract me from the pain.

After lunch, we headed to Apo Whang-Od to get her signature three dots' tattoos. The line was long. We were the sixth in the group. The first group had thirty-seven people. We met some tourists from other countries besides the US, and there were Canadians and Europeans, mostly from younger generations. I was the last one in our family to get the three dots. Apo Whang-Od was not even wearing eyeglasses. She first marked the spot where she would put her signature. Then when she started, I almost cried; it was very painful compared to her grandniece technique. The first dot was bleeding. I almost cried and backed out! But people watching were cheering, and my family gave me encouraging words until Apo Whang-Od finished. The dots cost fifty pesos each, so three dots were 150 pesos. We also gave her red lipstick and chocolates as gifts. I am honored and proud to meet the living legend and have her signature tattooed on my arm. Apo-Whang Od is passing the art of traditional "batok" tattooing to the younger generations by training her grandnieces. As the Vogue magazine quote, "Apo Whang-Od symbolizes the strength and beauty of the Filipino spirit."

### "The Legend Has Retired" .... Reggie Finishes his Twenty Years with the Military

Commander Reginaldo Cagampan, known to many of us as Reggie, is a pediatric nurse practitioner in the Navy Corps. His historical nursing journey dates back 20 years ago from Guam to other locations around the globe, on land, aboard ships, and in war zones. He earned his Bachelor's Degree in Nursing at the University of Guam, then was commissioned in the United States Navy as a Nurse Corps officer in 2002 and deployed at the Naval Medical Center in San Diego (NMCSD) in the Neonatal Intensive Care (NICU) and pediatric in-patient ward. In 2006 he was deployed to Iraq with the Marine Logistic Group as an En-route Care nurse, where they evacuated the injured to medical facilities for comprehensive care. As a military man, his assignment was never steady in one place.

In 2007, he moved back to Guam as a NICU Nurse at the Naval Hospital of Guam. He worked as a clinical instructor in Maternal Child and Pediatric Nursing at the University of Guam School of Nursing and was involved with community services. He returned to NMCSD in 2010 and served as a NICU division officer and clinical educator. As a certified Green Belt Lean Six Sigma, he was proud to spearhead the command initiative in decreasing central line-associated bloodstream infection. In 2013, he was selected for Duty Under Instruction (DUINS) for the Pediatric Nurse Practitioner Master's Degree program at the University of San Diego. After completing his degree, his next tour of duty landed him at the United States Naval Hospital Yokosuka, Japan, as a nurse practitioner department head in the Pediatric Primary Care Medical Home Port. As the department head of that unit, he took on multiple roles. In 2018, he returned to NMCSD and continued to serve as ordered, including joining the USNS Mercy in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. As he was close to ending his navy career as a Department Head of the Navy Readiness and Training Unit in Eastlake Chula Vista, CA, he received multiple awards and recognitions.





The military retirement ceremony of Commander Reginaldo Cagampan (Reggie) held last January 20, 2023, at the USS Midway Museum was extraordinarily executed in front of his family, relatives, friends, staff, and shipmates.

This event is dubbed the "swallowing of the anchor," a metaphor that symbolizes the sailor's significant and honorable accomplishments. Captain Molly Jenkins and Captain Edmund Milder, distinguished officers he had served with, presented awards and the Shadow Box, a time capsule of his military journey. The ceremony's highlight was the Flag Folding and "13 Folds," an explanation of its significance and the passing of the flag and recital of the "Olde Glory," which genuinely hit home and made us proud as an American.





CDR Cagampan delivered a moving recollection of his military career, his gratitude to his wife Arlene and children, and his parents who endured the separation as well as he served his country. The ceremony concluded with his shipmates as "Side Boys" who "piped him" "over the side," a distinct naval courtesy and a final farewell to a military career. Following the retirement ceremony, the guests were treated to a reception dinner and dancing at the Coronado Community Center, where more celebration and photo sharing took place.

#### PNASD collaborates with BUKAS

The Philippine Nurses Association of San Diego County, Inc. (PNASD) partnered with BUKAS (Buhay Uunlad Kalusugan Alalayan mga Seniors) Dance for a Healthy Heart at Escondido Women's Club on February 18, 2023, to coincide with the feast of St. Valentine. PNASD Board of Director and Marketing Chair Vivian Sanderlin coordinated the blood pressure and health education for seniors event with Mr. Ely Bananal, BUKAS President, and Lorna Delos Santos, BUKAS Advisor. President Perly Aguinaldo also was present during the event, and Elena Watkins volunteered as the assistant clerk who wrote down seniors' information and acquired consent.





PNASD served 35 clients for the 4-hour event, which included educating seniors on the importance of taking their medications, regular check-ups with their health providers, exercise, good sleeping habits, and a properly nutritious diet. Most of the health education and referrals were well received by the seniors, especially those with high blood pressure and a history of coronary artery diseases. PNASD volunteers also advised them on the importance of flu and Covid vaccination boosters. Two candidates with the lowest and healthy blood pressures, a male and a female, were recognized as Mr. and Mrs. Bukas Sweethearts with a presentation in the program of a bouquet and sash for the female and a sash for the male presented by PNASD nurses and everyone was encouraged to dance for a healthy heart.





Overall, the event was a success, and a great exposure of PNASD in helping the seniors promote the general welfare, encouraging them to maintain good health and well-being, and advising seniors to attend the PNASD Mental Health Advocacy Fair on May 20, 2023, the flyer placed on the Bukas souvenir advertisement brochure. We sincerely thank all the seniors who participated in Bukas Blood Pressure Drive and Health Education. PNASD is honored to be invited and to be of valuable service in promoting health to the community of our senior citizens.

#### PNASD celebrates a SPARK Woman Story: Vivian Sanderlin

To celebrate National Woman's month with a theme of "Celebrating Women who tell us Stories," PNASD leaders unanimously selected Vivian Sanderlin, PNASD Chair of Marketing, a Board of Directors, Past President, past Chairwoman of the BOD.

Vivian's journey with PNASD is a legacy for our organization. She joined PNASD in 2005, starting as a member of Marketing and Advertising and becoming the President in 2018. Her role as chair- Woman of the Board of Director made PNASD a more valuable and visible partner in the community. Her hard work as the PNASD Covid Task force Vaccination Coordinator made it possible for PNASD to vaccinate close to seven thousand recipients and for our organization to receive grant money.





During her presidency, PNASD had the first successful minority nursing conference and received the first PNAA editorial award. She proposed that PNASD apply for LVN as Continuing Education Provider, and the City of San Diego Mayor's Office gave the Proclamation Award to PNASD. The creation of PNASD Facebook account occurred during her presidency. More importantly, her expert marketing skills and strategies are one of the reasons why PNASD is financially sustainable. Another success story happened during the Love month of February; Vivian coordinated the PNASD participation during the Love Your heart campaign, collaborating with Aetna/CVS Health doing Blood pressure screening. The four days, at six CVS sites, utilizing 39 volunteers who collectively worked 116 hours, serving 309 clients, prompted Aetna health to approve a 10k grant to implement PNASD's mission.



What is behind her success? Her passion for what she does, diligence and persistence, and a life filled with gratitude, humility, and generosity as her 30 years of nursing career as a Public health and Emergency Room Nurse made her a "people person" who is a kind, compassionate, very positive, and joyful person along with a very loving and supportive husband.





Vivian volunteerism goes far before her involvement with PNASD, and she loves volunteering in many community activities. She participated in numerous medical missions here and abroad, a true community advocate. Vivian wanted to be a journalist, but her love for writing is very apparent in articles she has written for PNASD Heritage, iPNAA, and The Filipino Press.





Among her many other talents is her love of dance, Philippine, modern, line dancing, ballroom dance, and she is a great dance instructor. She directed WR participation at the Networking Nights during the PNAA National Convention, winning two awards. She has worn many "hats" as a seasoned PNASD leader, Grant writer, marketer, emcee, vaccinator, mentor, and community leader, and during Covid, she found time to sew masks for her friends and families. #### **PNASD joins Love Your Heart Campaign**

The Philippine Nurses Association of San Diego County, Inc. (PNASD) partnered with Aetna/CVS for the Love Your Heart Campaign for four days, from February 13-16, 2023. PNASD created a station in CVS pharmacy and offered free blood pressure screenings and health education in several locations in San Diego, serving underserved communities in East County and Ramona. A total of 26 PNASD volunteers provided 120 hours of volunteer time and served 306 clients during the 4-day event.











Michelle Blas, a student at Southwestern College and one of the volunteers, wrote her experience as "while to some this may seem like a straightforward nursing skill, it's the commitment, devotion, and a sense of purpose that make every volunteer experience special." She further stated that President-elect Emeline Yabut, a faculty member at Southwestern College, inspired her to join the PNASD and informed her that the organization organizes many community-benefiting drives every year. The Love Your Heart campaign is one of those efforts. The goal of PNASD is to empower the neighborhood to take control of their health by making them aware of their BP numbers.

Michelle also added that not everyone knows the normal blood pressure range; systolic and diastolic measurements of less than 120 and 80, respectively, are considered average blood pressure values. Some people know that their number is high, but they are unaware of the ramifications for their general health. At this stage, Love Your Heart provides the person with information and health recommendations. A person with high blood pressure is more prone to suffer from medical conditions, including heart attack, kidney failure, and peripheral and coronary artery disease, and can be avoided by following a healthy diet, exercising regularly, limiting alcohol intake, quitting smoking, and ensuring they take their medications as prescribed. In addition to free BP checks, the clients who participated at each location received complimentary gift insulated bags, umbrellas, drink cups, hand wipes, and educational handouts. Michelle encourages others to join PNASD to volunteer, give back to the community, and collaborate to promote a healthy lifestyle.

To summarize, PNASD's role in teaching at the Love Your Heart Campaign made an impact on the vast majority of clients in increasing their knowledge on improving/promoting their health and wellness, prevention of heart disease, and awareness of Health Equity or Access to Health care moving towards Global Health. PNASD appreciates Aetna/CVS for the opportunity and is thankful to all the PNASD volunteers who made it successful.








#### **PNASD Induction and Orientation Program for New Members**

## A Tribute to PNASD Founding President - Eulogy to Fem Ramirez Dr. Carmen B. Galang PNAA and PNASD Past President

I am Carmen Galang, representing the Philippine Nurses Association of San Diego (PNASD) and the Philippine Nurses Association of America (PNAA). Today, we are here to pay respect and tribute to Fem Ramirez, who meant a great deal to our professional organizations, and to express our deepest condolences to Dan's family, Dale and Evelyn, and relatives of Fem.





I have known Fem for over 30 years. I remember her as a kind-hearted, caring nurse who was always concerned for the welfare of others. With the growing numbers of Filipino nurses in San Diego County, she saw the need to uphold the professional nursing practice and the professional image of Filipino nurses. She formed the Filipino Nurses Association (FNA), now called PNASD. Fem invited a few nurses at Paradise Valley Hospital on June 1974 to assemble, organize and create the Officers and Board of Directors. Fem served as president for two terms, 1974-1976. Fem's leadership incorporated the organization as a non-profit, tax-exempt status. Fem was also an action-oriented person, an activist, you may say, who appeared to fight for or against political issues affecting nursing, either State or Federal regulations, and laws.





Ten years after the formation of PNASD, and through the invitation of the National Organization of Philippine Nurses in the United States (NOPNAUS), now called PNAA, PNASD made its first representation in a national conference held in New Jersey in 1984. I was then the vice-president of FNA, and Laura Avendano was President. Fem, Sally Cabotaje, Elvie Magsarili, and other members and non-members attended. Fem's daughter Evelyn and

When talking with Evelyn last night during the viewing, she mentioned they had a good time touring New York, including a visit to Radio City. After the conference, we went to New York to do some shopping. Fem would not buy anything for herself but for her children, Dale and Evelyn. I think she should have bought something for Dan (sorry, Dan, you did not give her enough budget to spend). Fem was a very thoughtful and giving person. During the conference, we met the PNAA founding members and had excellent exchanges about the status of our respective associations.





When Fem saw the potential in me as an active member of the SD community, she encouraged me to run for PNASD president, and I was elected for two terms (1985-1987). Since then, I became involved with PNAA events and various offices before becoming PNAA president in 1994-1996. I highly credited Fem for motivating me to be my best. Fem was a good mentor.






Fem formed a Home Health Agency, the second agency in San Diego County. While working at Mercy Hospital, Fem came to see me and asked me to work for her since the licensing agency needed someone with a PHN certificate. I considered this option because of the growing trends of cutting hospital stays due to DRG regulations, a health care system cost-cutting measure. Home health nurses continue to care for patients discharged early from the hospital. Fem also hired the PNAA founding president Dr. Miraflor to work in her second Home Health Agency based in Los Angeles and another RN to direct her third agency in Ventura County. When Fem saw the need for

Home visits were flourishing and increasing, so Fem hired more Filipino nurses to work on a contractual basis to supplement their income from their regular jobs. Our patients came from all over SD County. I remember making home visits as far as Ramona and Escondido (about thirty miles away-one away from each location). Although the travel was exhausting, I enjoyed returning to the office in National City, where I wanted the family-type atmosphere. I could see Dale and Evelyn running around in the office after school and Don quietly working there. I quit after over three years because of my ambition to pursue graduate education. I graduated with my master's degree in 1991 and my Doctorate in 1995. Since then, I have been preoccupied with school-related activities, caring for my aging parents, and working at SDSU and CSULB as a faculty member. I would only see Fem and Dan at PNASD annual events.

I felt sad to hear the news when I learned she passed away through Dan's message to PNASD member Vickie Berbano. Fem, you have done so much in your life, and God did not want you to suffer any longer. We will never forget your legacy. I want to quote what you said in the PNASD history "Let us continue to maintain and promote our Professional Organization for the professional growth and development of our members, ourselves, and our profession."

From all of us, goodbye, Fem, and may you now rest in peace.

At that time, I struggled to understand my nursing career. I am burnt out and overworked but poorly compensated. I was trying to immigrate to America, but the visa retrogression caused a long queue. So, I wrote a simple essay on why PNASD will choose me as a scholar, and I received an e-mail that PNASD would sponsor me for the event. It was an instant vacation - free accommodation and food (from the event).

But as the saying goes, 'It is not growth if it does not scare you.' So, I am taking the leap of faith, ignoring all the fear, and trying my best to make it work.

My relationship with Nursing has been interesting, and I am not alone in this sentiment. It can be pretty hot and cold. It is like day and night sometimes. But the passion only goes away slowly.

Every day, I strive to become a Nursing leader like the people I met at the conference in 2016. I thank PNA San Diego for sponsoring me and allowing me to meet great people who inspire me, including Sir Marlon Saria. He might not know me personally, but in 2016, he was a part of PNA San Diego, and he was the one who informed me thru e-mail that I got the sponsorship. I started following him on Instagram, and year by year, I see his achievements and the heights that he is taken in his career, which is awe-inspiring.

It might take a while for me to achieve even a tiny bit of what he has reached, but I am always hopeful that my work matter and that I am making a difference, despite the good and the struggles that my profession has shown and taught me."

The stories of our two scholars demonstrate that PNASD, as a nursing organization, promotes professional development for nurses, in the US and internationally. ### PNASD makes History with a Successful Completion of the First Mental Health Awareness and Resource Fair Jay Larrosa, MSN, PHN, RN-BC, ACM-RN, FACDONA PNASD Chair, Mental Health Advocacy Committee

The Philippine Nurses Association of San Diego County, Inc. (PNASD) made 2022 the year to address mental health matters formally and proactively. In February of that year, initial conversations took place that PNASD, as a professional nursing organization, would do more regarding the mental health of its members and their members' families, friends, peers, and the community. The same group comprised the PNASD's Mental Health Advocacy (MHA) Committee.





While it is evident that more needs to be done about mental health, it also became apparent to the committee the challenges they may face, especially when providing the needed mental health resources and services. They realized they would need to focus on what PNASD can accomplish concerning their capabilities and limitations due to several factors, such as the scope of practice, and not all members specialize or are practicing in the mental health space. To be an effective advocate, resource, and partner for mental health, the committee finalized its mission, vision, and overall goal.

The committee, together with the rest of PNASD, continues to be guided by the following:

Mission: PNASD advocates for mental health through education, resource access, and community partnership. Vision: increased awareness of the importance of acknowledging mental health to the well-being of the individual, families, and community.

Overall Goal: Promote mental health wellness and raise awareness of mental and behavioral disorders by being an advocate and a resource to individuals, families, and the community on accessible, caring, and culturally competent services.



Since then, PNASD has accomplished the following:

- -Four Part Educational Series: "Understanding Mental Health and Mental Illness," "Living a Mentally Healthy Life: Mental Health on a Personal Level," Living a Mentally Healthy Life: Mental Health in the Workplace," and "Mental Health Awareness through Community Partnership."
- -Dedicated Mental Health (MH) Section on PNASD Website that includes but is not limited to recorded presentations on MH educational series and corresponding PowerPoint presentations, MH Tools & Resources
- -MHA Committee generated a brochure and gave it to attendees during community outreach
- -MHA Committee Representation by providing expert speakers to events such as during the Philippine Consulate Retreat

This year 2023, PNASD added to their list of accomplishments a free community event, Mental Health Awareness and Resource Fair, held on May 20, 2023, at Sweetwater High School in National City, CA. During the opening program, Fr. Joselito Tiongson, a military chaplain at NAS North Island, officiated the reflection. After the reflection, PNASD President Perly Aguinaldo, National City Mayor Ron Morrison, San Diego County Health and Human Services Agency Behavioral Health Services Chief Medical Officer Dr. Michael Krelstein, and Philippine Medical Association of San Diego, Dr. Renato dela Rosa provided their messages. National City Mayor Ron Morrison spoke about the importance of mental health in the national city and the need for the support services available at the mental health fair. Perly shared a personal story about a family member affected by mental health. She reminded attendees that help was available and urged them to seek it whenever needed. Dr. Krelstein stated, "Perly mentioned to prioritize ourselves, and there is a need for Call in Action. Everyone's ultimate responsibility is to increase awareness on mental health and not just PNASD."



The Chair of the PNASD's Mental Health Advocacy Committee, Jay Larrosa, officially opened the event. He urged attendees to end the stigma on mental health and prioritize mental health as we do with physical health. During the closing program, Associate Director for Mental Health Family Health Centers of San Diego, Dr. Dixie Galapon, and PNASD Board of Directors, Vivian Sanderlin delivered more important messages. In closing remarks, Ms. Sanderlin emphasized the importance of self-care and being kind to herself/himself and each other's, as kindness promotes mental health. She also extended her gratitude to all guest speakers, sponsors, donors, and attendees and made a special mention to PNASD Members who enjoyed putting the event together. It was amazing to have most of the speakers from last year's four-part mental health education series offering come to the event and continue supporting PNASD on mental health efforts and speaking about the essential subject. The Co-Chair of the PNASD's Mental Health Advocacy Committee, Brandee Hassell hosted both opening and closing programs.

Attendees also joined any of the free wellness activities offered during the event, such as Yoga, Zumba, Art Therapy, massages, and Dance the Stress Out. In addition, attendees enjoyed free food and prize giveaways. Resources primarily on mental health were also available to attendees, such as those offered by San Diego County's Live Well on Wheels (WOW). Vaccination was also provided onsite by Champions for Health. Numerous governmental and private organizations exhibited at the event to share resources they can give the community.





PNASD is grateful to its officers, members and their family members, volunteers, guests, and everyone who made the event a success. Lourdes Deperio serves as MHA Committee's Advisor. In addition, the following subcommittees of the MHA Committee were very instrumental in making sure that PNASD delivered a high-quality event to the community: Budget and Finance, Programs and Activities (Prize Giveaway included), Marketing and Attendance, Hospitality and Registration, and Logistics. PNASD's Research Committee was also present during the event to conduct a survey and understand the real need of the community members. Of course, the Community Outreach Committee was also available to provide first aid to attendees if needed, and the Membership Committee shared with attendees what PNASD is about. Representatives from other PNAA Chapters, such as PNA California Orange County and PNAA South Riverside County, were also in attendance.


